Nomination and Gratitude:

I will begin this application by sharing my upmost gratitude and thanks to the judging panel, everyone who contributed to making this application possible, and Shana Trichon and Heather Reynolds. Stand Up For Justice is truly a remarkable organization, and I am extremely grateful for this opportunity. Shana and Heather have given so much time and effort to make positive changes in our community, and their leadership, friendship, and dedication are incredible. I am also so thankful for the student and two parents who nominated me for this award. I am thankful that they felt compelled to share their thoughts as to why I am deserving of this award. Their nominations are included at the end of this application.

Before I begin to describe the process where I have stood up for justice, I would like to share my connection to Judaism, which will help express my connection to the projects/lessons that I will be sharing in this application. As the advisor of the CB West Jewish Student Union, I thought understanding my passion towards spreading awareness and unity is so important. I grew up in a Jewish family where I had a Bat Mitzvah, was confirmed, was involved in a Jewish youth group called BBYO, attended a Jewish overnight camp, went to Israel in college, and have established these same milestones for my family. I have two teenagers in Central Bucks (my son is at Unami and my daughter is at CB South), and they have both had a Bar and Bat Mitzvah, are studying for Confirmation, both are involved in the same youth group and go to a Jewish overnight camp, and we took them to Israel with my mom and brother's family

2 years ago. I am involved as a parent volunteer in their youth group, I serve as a trustee on my synagogue's board, and I also volunteer in many capacities at their overnight camp.

I have been teaching in Central Bucks since 2005, and I have been fortunate to teach at CB South, East, and West. I have been at CB West since 2012, and it was not until October of 2023 that I was approached by a student to start a Jewish Student Union. There is a chapter at East and South, so I was more than thrilled to take on this opportunity. I didn't realize that what I was signing up for was truly an experience that would change my life. I have a group of approximate 20 members, and I have an incredible leadership board of 7 students. They have shown such compassion towards one another, and they enjoy sharing stories of their Jewish culture, customs, foods, and experiences. We meet once or twice a month and call our events "Schmooze and Schmears"--- where we talk and eat! The kids pick a relevant topic, and we discuss--- while having delicious foods. We also had a "Jewish Foods Bake Sale" where the kids baked and sold Jewish cultural foods. As an art educator who really loves my classroom and learning environment, I never thought I would be so moved and touched by such an amazing group of students. I have always run my classroom as a place of acceptance, kindness and understanding, and this mantra has translated well to the JSU. The Jewish Student Union at CB West is a special group of passionate, engaged, thoughtful, and compassionate students.

Now that I have explained to background of my Jewish lifestyle and how the CB West Jewish Student Union got started, I can now share more of the hands-on lessons/programs that have taken place and are the reasons why I have been nominated for this award.

Describe the precipitating events that motivated you to initiate these lessons/activities:

As described above, the Jewish Student Union at CB West was established in early November 2023. It started with one student asking if I would become the JSU advisor at CB West and has grown to a group that is about twenty members strong. We have a board of seven amazing students, and without them, I would not be nominated for this award. It is with their help, collaboration, and heart, that our group grew and came to fruition. I have three Presidents, one in 10th, 11th and 12th grades and they oversee all operations of our group. My Secretary takes care of making agendas and all email communication. My Social planner is in charge of all social events, from Sign Up Genius needs for events, to social programming. My Schmooze and Schmear leader is in charge of all conversations and content at meetings when we have discussions and open forums. My incredible Social Media Manager is responsible for positively promoting our group on the JSU Instagram.

We have held numerous events in our first year, such as:

- 1- **MONTHLY:** Membership meetings with a Schmooze and Schmear relevant topic and cultural food! Students sign up to bring Jewish foods on a Sign-Up Genius. We always have an activity or topic of discussion for all to participate in and enjoy.
- 2- **NOVEMBER:** Introductory JSU Schmooze and Food Interest Meeting open to all!!! Students wore nametags, described their connection to Judaism and why they chose to come to the meeting!
- 3- **DECEMBER:** We had a Hanukkah party with a white elephant event where the kids shared Hannukah foods and swapped Hanukkah gifts. It was awesome!

- 4- **DECEMBER:** Student leadership formed by asking for leadership volunteers. We ended up forming a JSU board of 7 members.
- 5- **JANUARY:** Student leaders designed a JSU t-shirt for members to purchase to wear to promote and celebrate our group. Most students purchased and we wear to school and meetings/events!
- 6- **JANUARY:** Jewish foods bake sale in the CB West lobby! This was such a fun and successful event and students baked challahs, cookies, apple cake, etc.
- 7- **JANUARY:** A speaker (Congregation Beth Or religious school director) came in to educate our group about the history of Israel and misleading news headlines.
- 8- **FEBRUARY:** A Holocaust survivor all-school presentation during Lunch and Learn in the auditorium for all CBW interested students (with the opportunity to buy a signed book from the survivor)- collaboration with the Holocaust Museum and Education Center in Elkins Park, PA.
- 9- MARCH: A Cooking for the Community event: We partnered with CB West's Cooking for the Community group and our Holocaust survivor came in and baked with the students and we donated the food to our community members in need.
- 10- MARCH: Some of our leadership attended a speaker event at the Doylestown Borough Hall planned by Shana Trichon. Rabbi Jason Bonder from Congregation Beth Or spoke about the history and current state of Israel.
- 11- **APRIL:** A majority of our leadership attended an Intercultural Community Panel at Pearl S Buck. The event was called "Leading with Humanity and Compassion: Virtues from Faith Traditions and Beyond". We attended with some of the MSA leaders, and we were invited by school board member Mariam Mahmud.
- 12- **APRIL:** We held a Passover seder event with our members. We shared Passover foods, talked about our upcoming MSA/JSU collaboration, and two of our board members played the role of co-Rabbi's and led us in a fun Passover seder!
- 13- MAY: A Jewish Student Union and Muslim Student Association collaboration event is held at CB West. This event will be touched on in greater detail in this application. This collaboration was my brainchild, and the intention is to show the commonalities and connections the JSU and MSA students have. It is not meant to be a political event- it is called "JSU/MSA Interfaith Event: Cultural Connections". The goal is to set an example for CBSD to demonstrate the power of student voice, and the importance of compassionately working can lead finding connections.

Describe the lessons/activities; and if adapted from another source please reference.

As mentioned above, there have been many lessons and activities that have taken place during this year as the Jewish Student Union advisor. I am so proud of my leadership and students who have given their time, dedication, passion, and collaboration to this year's JSU activities.

I'd like to use this section to highlight and share more of the details and activities of the Jewish Student Union (JSU)/Muslim Student Association (MSA) collaboration. I would like to share the steps of this collaboration as well as some resources that have been used in this collaboration.

The collaboration began after my JSU students hosted Aaron Nielsenshultz, the Religious School Director at Congregation Beth Or in Maple Glen, PA in January 2024. Aaron visits other JSU chapters in the area (Upper Dublin, SB South, Wissahickon and Cheltenham as examples). He offered to come to talk to my

students about the history of Israel. The purpose of the visit was not to go in a deep dive on the warrather, Aaron wanted to share with the students how Israel formed, the disputes with other nations, the land, the general history, and misleading news headlines. It was an engaging experience and the students listened and asked lots of great questions. Aaron truly gave them the path that Israel took in history, and he also talked about the misconceptions of the news and news articles.

This was a very successful and interesting event, and it culminated with about a dozen JSU students writing letters to the IDF thanking them for protecting Israel.

A few weeks after our event, the MSA posted flyers around CBW inviting any students at CBW to participate in a letter writing campaign with the title "Invest in PA Not Bombs". It was asking students to join collectively to write a letter to PA State Treasurer "listing ways we can better use the \$\$ here in PA, rather than for killing more innocents in Gaza". This caused a great deal of public scrutiny on social media and beyond, and I instantly saw that there was tension between the two groups. I took it upon myself to set up a meeting with the MSA advisor to discuss ways we could come together and collaborate and find commonalities. It has been my goal to have the JSU and the MSA work together to identify similarities in their cultures, and we have met many times both in my classroom and the MSA advisor's room. The students have been doing a lot of talking- and listening, and through this time, they have discovered so many things they have in common. These include areas such as food, fasting, language, clothing, and customs. The students have been working together to prepare for an event on May 3 called "JSU/MSA Interfaith Event: Cultural Connections". The event entails a collaborative presentation that the leadership from both groups have been working on together. They will be teaching one another about the cultures and customs of their faiths. They will then play a fun game of Jeopardy at the end. Students will be bringing in foods from their cultures and sharing them with one another. This was put together by creating a Sign-Up Genius which contains both Jewish and Muslim foods. The event will be videoed by an in house CBSD videographer, and this will also include interviews of the leadership talking about their experiences working together. The video will be available and posted on the CBSD website and may also make its way to some local news stations.




The Origins of Judaism

- We can't eat anything with flour (or anything that rises such as bread) during Passover





























Explain how the lessons/activities teach students the importance of respecting others no matter what religious, racial, cultural, or other differences exist.

The activities of collaboration between the JSU and the MSA have been absolutely inspiring, and they show the importance of the MSA and JSU members respecting one another's religious, racial, and cultural connections, and differences. Ms. Levin has been one of the most supportive teachers that I know at CB West. I had the pleasure of having Ms. Levin as a teacher since the beginning of Sophomore year in Art 1. I can recall that during some Lunch-and-Learn days, she would shut down her room and give a voice to LGBTQ+ students in the school. Although I haven't been a part of these meetings, I do know that a lot of students walked out of those meetings feeling relieved and heard by other students in our community.

Ms. Levin continued to help students the following year as well. Come around Junior year, Ms. Levin announced to my AP Art class that she would shut down her room for Jewish students that wanted to unite and talk about experiences of being a Jewish student at CB West. I came to the meeting which prompted a discussion about issues our school faces with the rise of antisemitism. These meetings continued, and the Jewish Student Union chose to have a leadership board which I am a part of.

In February, tensions began to rise on social media about the conflict going on between Palestine and Israel. Students were verbally harassing one another on social media and bullying one another over views about the conflict. Then, the Muslim Student Association at our school held a meeting in support of defunding the conflict, which caused up-roar all over social media and even the news. Seeing this conflict occur, Ms. Levin quickly jumped into action and held numerous meetings with Mr. A (the Muslim Student Association advisor). She effectively worked out a solution that would help disperse tension on social media by suggesting that we do an interfaith event where both clubs would learn about the cultural and religious life of the other club.

On Instagram, both clubs teased a collaboration, which I believe calmed down the tension on social media. I haven't witnessed a single fight on Snapchat over personal beliefs since we began to collaborate with one another. I genuinely believe that no other teacher would have stepped up and made such a huge impact in a conflict such as this one. It would have gone ignored. Ms. Levin chose to step up and take action, making sure that both sides become more understanding of one another with every meeting we have. I can confidently say that the MSA and the JSU have learned more about each other and have grown more tolerant over our beliefs, which is an incredibly hard thing to do considering most adults aren't brave enough to become understanding of one another. Ms. Levin shows this bravery and strength as she continues to push towards our interfaith event, despite any roadblocks that appear to be ahead.

I, and many others, can safely say that Ms. Levin is one of the most supportive teachers at CB West and truly makes an impact on her students. No teacher, that I at least know of, has ever attempted to mend two seemingly separate groups effectively. And for that, I have gained a massive amount of respect for her and what she is doing as a teacher. Ms. Levin truly captures what it is like to be open-minded and bring respect between two people or groups that don't see eye to eye and give a voice to those in our community who don't.

My mom and I chose to nominate Ms. Levin for the Stand up For Justice Educator Award due to the unconditional amount of kindness she's shown me, and everyone else at CB West. She always treats everyone with respect no matter their religion, background, or even feelings about her and the JSU (Jewish Student Union). When I first joined the JSU I was nervous about the backlash we would get due to the rise in antisemitism, and once we joined forces with West's MSA (Muslim Student Association) many of us were worried about what they would think about our club. But every time we had doubts Ms. Levin would remind us that what we're doing is important and that we are being leaders for our community. But she would also let us know that it was okay to be scared and if we were ever uncomfortable there would be nothing wrong with taking a step back. Ms. Levin is the definition of Standing up for Justice. She took it upon herself to speak with students who were reposting antisemitic things from our schools Snapchat story, she created the opportunity to support and join forces with the MSA when they were facing backlash due to their beliefs, and when others told her that a private activity we had in our club was wrong she quickly apologized for hurt feelings but refused to agree that it was wrong because she will always stand up for justice and won't take back something she believes in.
